Our Order has supported both of these projects over the last two years, and I hope we can continue to provide that support over the next year. Each of these programs is very near and dear in the hearts of many of our members because they address challenges that are prominent in their own lives, be it a child or grandchild with autism or other developmental disability that is aging out of essential services, or be it a parent, grandparent, spouse, or even themselves struggling with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of dementia.

Indeed, these conditions have touched my life personally as well. I myself am the grandmother of a beloved autistic grandchild who faces the many challenges of relying on a system that has not yet caught up to the needs of this neurodiverse population. On the other end of life's continuum, I recently lost my father as a result of an inability to swallow due to progressive dementia. Our most recent Past Grand Matrons, Sisters Laura and Kimberlie, have spent the last two years bringing these projects to our attention, educating us to the good works they perform in our communities, and fostering our love and enthusiasm in support of that good work.

Rather than take up a new cause this year, Larry and I would like to capitalize on the momentum that they have generated as we redouble our efforts to make a difference in the lives of those we love. I hope you will join us in that endeavor. We will be holding special events in the North and the South this year to support these projects jointly. We will also have silicone bracelets, pins, and other items available to thank you for your donation.

Keeping our Promises - Campaign to Restore Outreach Funding

Our internal project for 2024 is a year-long campaign to restore funding to the Outreach Services Program as outlined in Section 32510 of our Constitution and Laws. These funds are specifically designated to provide assistance to members in need who are not residents of the Senior Living Community but who may be better helped in their own communities. Unfortunately, this program was defunded several years ago and has been only marginally equipped to provide tangible assistance to our members in need.



Outreach Services was designed to provide referral to appropriate agencies **and financial assistance** to allow qualified members the continued ability to live in their community when their health or other circumstances threaten that ability. This program was funded through the Endowment fund in the past and it has been responsible for assisting countless numbers of our members who were in need of help but for which relocation to our SLC was not practical, feasible, or in their best interest. Outreach Services has been the vehicle by which we could help our Sisters and Brothers in need, both financially and by assisting them to access outside services, without removing them from their communities and their all-important support systems which often include their families, friends, and their own Chapters. It is my hope that with your help, this program can be restored to help us keep the promises we have made to each other.

In short, the purpose of our Order is to provide for the welfare of the wives, daughters, mothers, widows, and sisters of Master Masons; indeed, for the welfare of all of our Sisters and Brothers. Restoring Outreach Services will ensure that we have the resources and that we are prepared to use them to make good on those promises when we hear a cry for help, the call of want, or the wail of sorrow of our fellow Sisters and Brothers. So as to sustain the program once restored, there are a few membership requirements that must be met for eligibility, however, providing a robust and reliable Outreach program to most of our members, in conjunction with services which they may have access to through Masonic Outreach, is an important step in acknowledging that the lives and welfare of our members matter to us, both individually and collectively, regardless of where they reside.

I hope you will help us send that message throughout our Order by joining us in support of the Northern and Southern fundraising events scheduled this year to re-establish Outreach Services, which falls under the direction of the Eastern Star Homes Board of Trustees per the Constitution and Laws and which, in the past, have been administered through the SLC. We also hope you will help us by attending these events and participating enthusiastically and generously in your local Chapter collections designated to this project.

All funds collected will go to the Endowment Fund, so if you would like to send in a personal donation, please go to our website www.oescal.org, or mail your check to the Grand Chapter Office, payable to the Endowment Fund, and include Outreach Services in the memo line. It is our sincere hope that by calling attention to this program that once served large numbers of our members in their time of need, we can put it back on the front burner as an important tool in allowing us to fulfill our obligation and **keep the promises** we have made to each other.

History of our Eastern Star Home....Chapter One!

Hello again—With Spring on the horizon, it is time for me to share another editorial message. I shared in the last edition that I would like to put together some history of our Senior Living Community. There is an outstanding article in this edition from one of the staff members about our Home that really describes it in the present. As I gathered history of where this "service" has traveled to this point, I was overwhelmed with much detail and it will be difficult to synthesize it, but I will attempt to touch on the highlights.

The idea of providing a home for our aging members existed long before it became a reality. Resolutions happened at Grand Chapter Sessions before 1880. But nothing actually happened until 1889 when there was a committee appointed to explore this idea. By 1892, the Grand Lodge of California was building a home on the site in Decoto and Eastern Star folks began to think we should join in that endeavor. We made contributions in that direction. The building of that home began in 1896 and we continued to support it. A site in Covina was also secured by the Masons for a home for children.

The Worthy Grand Patron in 1900 expressed the need for a home for "mothers, and Sisters who have no claim on the Masonic facility." The Worthy Grand Matron of the following year recommended that we explore having a home in Southern California to bring this about. Again, not much happened in that direction.

In 1908, a survey was provided for members about the idea of such a home, but there was very little response. Sometime before then there was actually an Eastern Star Home Association of Southern California that had formed and were doing their own exploration and they began promoting the idea of a home in their local. By 1915, it was reported that a site had been found but it was not until 1925 that the building of such a home be an ultimate objective. Many amendments to the Grand Chapter Constitution were happening over this period of time.

In 1926, a Site Committee was appointed and in 1927, a \$1 assessment was levied on members. The first Board was appointed in 1929 and there was a Grand Chapter vote accepting the purchase of a site in the Los Angeles area. Progress in that direction continued and ground was broken on September 23,1931 at the site in Brentwood with the cornerstone laid on October 17 of that year.




Our "Original" Eastern Star Home in Brentwood, CA



The Grand Banquet following the closing of the 134th Session was the final farewell for the 2023 Grand Officers and we had fun getting to know the folks at our table.

There are many things that Ohio does differently from California, of course. The most surprising for me was that the Grand Representatives in Ohio are all women. I asked about it, and was told that legislation to expand the Grand Representatives to include men had been submitted, but had not yet received a majority of votes.

Of the differences that Cathie noted after our Grand Chapter in 2022 was the fact that everyone wore jeans, t-shirts, and sneakers, even the Grand Officers. That was the most surprising for her. I did remind her that we wore the t-shirts in support of our Eastern Star Home during the session that our residents attended as a group, not just any t-shirt or all sessions.

Like other Grand Jurisdictions, Ohio's membership is decreasing. The Jurisdiction of Ohio has 145 Chapters. There had been seven consolidations since the 2022 Grand Sessions, with another three in progress. The membership as of this Grand Session was 17,018. That was a decrease in membership by 1,347 from the prior year. Attendance at Grand Chapter was 687 in state registrations, and another 77 from other jurisdictions.

After Grand Chapter, we explored more of the area around Cincinnati. We visited the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, a museum that takes you from the start of the slave trade in the western hemisphere to instances of modern-day slavery. If you are ever in the Cincinnati area, I highly recommend visiting that museum.

The next day we went to the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden. The Cincinnati Zoo focuses on conservation and education. The oldest American Zoo building is now home to the Reptile House. We got to see Fiona the hippo who was born at the zoo in 2017. The habitats were designed for the comfort of the animals first. There were sections for nocturnal animals, where special lighting was set up to not mess with their eyesight.

For our last day in Ohio we booked a dinner cruise on the Ohio River. The boat dock was on the Kentucky side of the river, so we walked to Kentucky and visited the Newport Aquarium nearby. The dinner cruise was fun. We watched the sun set, and a spectacular thunderstorm roll in. We opted for a Lyft back to the hotel.

The next day, we were on our way back to California.


